<b>Summary:</b> (machine translated) Wild, remote gorge. Together with Rio Cadramazzo long tour with 700hm		
<b>Hydrology:</b>		
<b>Access:</b> (machine translated) A23 until Pontebba exit. Go down the canal valley until you reach the group of houses of Vidali. After about 1.5km you will pass a pedestrian bridge over the Fella. There is a large parking area just after the bridge.		
<b>Approach:</b> (machine translated) Cross the bridge and follow the marked trail past the highway parking lot. In the area of the Cadramazzo ruins, turn left up to the bike path and immediately after follow the 619 markings further uphill. Pass the entry of the lower Rio Cadramazzo and continue into a small notch with a view of the canyon of the upper Rio Cadramazzo. Continue climbing until you reach a World War I tunnel and from there cross more flatly into the valley of the Rio Livinal. After crossing a side stream, the path crosses high above the narrow gorge of the Rio Livinal - Above this gorge, descend steeply into the streambed.		
<b>Tour:</b> (machine translated) The gorge quickly becomes very narrow * 30m rappel from tree with sling on the left * 35m rappel, 2 anchors in small niche on the left, space for max. 2 people * 29m rappel, large rock platform, 2 anchors high on the left * 3m downclimb * 18m rappel, one anchor on the right * hiking and downclimbing 100m * 10m anchor on boulder in the middle of the river * hiking and downclimbing 50m * 15m anchor left * Then laborious downclimbing over jammed tree trunks before the gorge opens - from here escape options on the right. This is followed by 500m of downclimbing and hiking with a few slides before you reach the streambed of the Rio Cadramazzo above the large waterfall. * 43m rappel, old anchor and tree sling on the right * hiking & downclimbing * 8m rappel very old Multimonti Spit on rock right * hiking & downclimbing * 13m rappel rope sling right * hiking & downclimbing * 30m rappel tree with sling and chain link - very exposed to reach Hiking & downclimbing in a chaos of boulders * After a short gorge, you stand in front of the two high waterfalls of the lower Rio Cadramazzo - description there.		

**Return:** (machine translated)

Continue descending through the lower Rio Cadramazzo or exit via its access trail.
