Summary: (machine translated)

The Mascarada Ravine is the natural companion of the Clotet, both located in the spectacular surroundings of the Three Waterfalls Route of Cerler (Ardonés, Clotet and Mascarada). It is an open and panoramic descent, with a very attractive route that combines abseiling, abseiling and soft water sections, surrounded by a high mountain environment with excellent views over the Benasque valley.

The route has eight rappels, with a maximum height of nearly 33 meters, and a moderate but continuous technical development. Its dynamic character and its proximity to the Clotet make it ideal to combine them in the same day.

Hydrology: (machine translated)

In the irrigation ditch, on the PR and at mid-slope but with a lot of climbing.

Access: (machine translated)

Take the N260 to Castejón de Sos, where we turn off to Benasque on the A139.

Access to the Mascarada and Clotet bcos.

We cross Benasque and continue along the road. At the traffic circle we turn to Cerler, we pass the village towards the slopes.

At pk 9.4 we have a sharp right curve and a track to the left along the slope. We take it and park at the end, in Bco Ardonés.

Approach: (machine translated)

Access to the Mascarada and Clotet banks

We cross the ravine and by a path that comes out on the opposite bank we go about 1 km until we reach an old track. Here we turn right onto a path that this time goes up the slope towards the head of Mascarada and Clotet.

Open, very continuous and very similar to Clotet.

When we get down to the river, we cross it and go up the other side to the trail.
